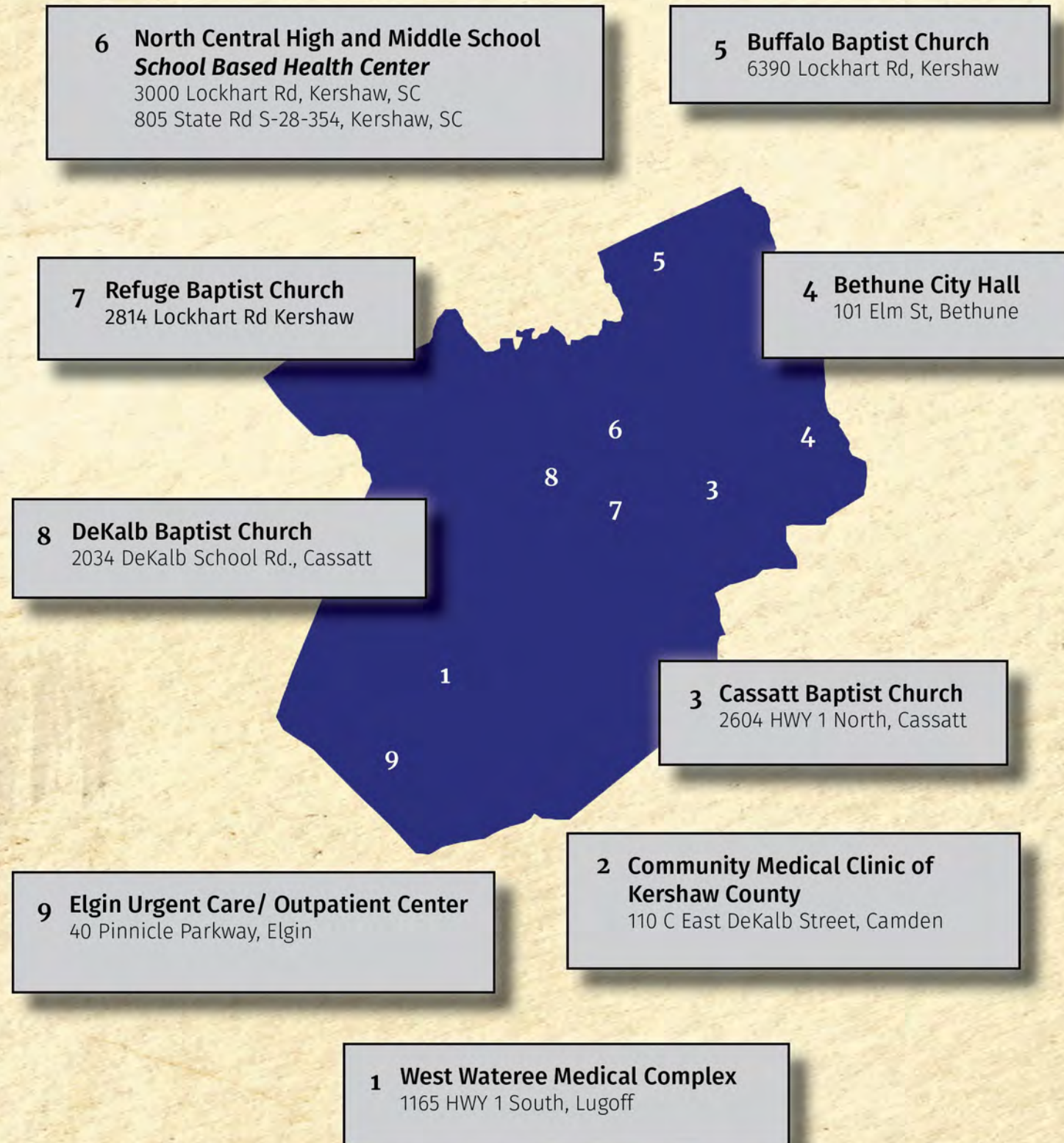

November 30, 2018 marked 20 years of providing care to Kershaw County residents.

This is a wonderful milestone to reflect on what the Community Medical Clinic of Kershaw County has accomplished over the last two decades!

We were founded on the mission of providing medical care to those in our community who did not have health insurance. Our mission is still the same in spirit, but has grown significantly!

We still provide direct medical care to those in our community who cannot afford to otherwise see a doctor, and we've expanded into improving population health to make Kershaw County the healthiest in South Carolina.

Providing direct medical services is important. These services are like life lines. We (figuratively) toss out a flotation device to patients, help them to shore, and then give them the resources to take charge of their own health and well-being.

Today, we have coverage across the entire county. Our patients can make appointments with our nurse practitioner in our Camden or Lugoff offices, as well as church satellite offices in North Central. We also have a full-time licensed marriage and family therapist on staff to assist patients in handling life's challenges.

Students at North Central High School and North Central Middle School can be treated by a CMC nurse practitioner on campus through our School-Based Health Center. This means less absences due to sickness and more time in the classroom for students.

Our services mean our patients have HOPE to live a healthier tomorrow.

In addition to the services our nurse practitioners and mental health counselor can provide, we have partnerships with local medical professionals who either come to our Camden office to treat patients, or allow us to refer patients to their medical practice at no cost to the patient.

Our partnership with KershawHealth is also vital, as they provide most diagnostic services for our patients.

Direct medical care is only one part of our mission, and I encourage you to check out this entire report to truly understand our two-fold mission.

We're an organization where relationships matter. We work really hard to blend technology with the process of reaching out, staying in touch and listening. Technology is a tool to get to know our patients better. We gather data to evaluate and see trends, to support our number one priority -- our relationships.

School-Based Health Center

Functions as a minute clinic on campus at North Central High School. An on site nurse practitioner can diagnose and treat common illnesses, care for minor wounds, can write prescriptions, provide sports physicals, and routine lab tests. The SBHC also provides counseling services to support mental wellness. In the last year we have expanded mental health counselors into all Kershaw County High Schools and decreased unnecessary absences at North Central High School.

A physical therapist treats patients once a week.

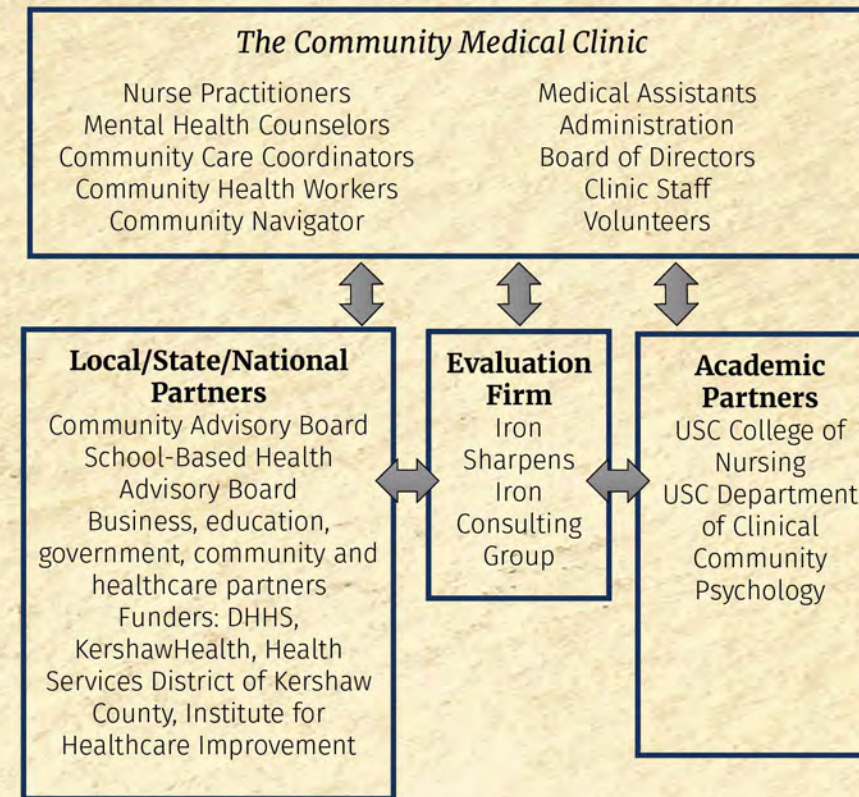

Both proclamations honor and recognize both the clinic's staff and volunteers. The Community Medical Clinic is a state-of-the-art, out-patient facility located at 110-C East DeKalb St. in Camden behind the United Way Holston Center. According to Annual Campaign Chair James Trotter Burns, the clinic has been successful in treating the health care needs of more than 900 of the county's low-income residents who have no health insurance. The clinic has thrived due to a constant and dedicated staff, inspired leadership, a cadre of over 100 caring and thoughtful volunteers, a range of medical specialists in a large referral network and importantly a community committed to the necessary funding. Burns said. The clinic is also the recipient of medications valued over \$1,500 from pharmaceutical companies through the Patient Assistance Program. With this mix of support, each patient receives \$12.50 in medicine and medical services for every \$1 donated; all of which translates to an astonishing 125 percent return, Burns said. Without the clinic, many patients would be forced to use the local emergency room where services are seven to eight times more costly than visits to the clinic, Burns said. In addition to medication and diagnosis, the clinic also provides counseling toward healthier life styles, a key to controlling many health problems, Burns added. The campaign kicked off Dec. 1, and Burns said their goal is \$110,000 this year. The clinic receives no federal funding, so its annual budget of \$300,000 comes from local foundations and contributions. All gifts are tax-deductible, Burns said.
